Book Review - Freemasonry An Introduction

A marvelous book of less than 200 pages that leads through history to becoming a Freemason, *Freemasonry An Introduction* explains what Freemasonry is, why men join, how it works, and the symbolism behind the ritual. The book explains that Freemasonry is NOT a religion, a path to power or status, or a conspiracy. But it IS a fraternity that uses ceremonies of initiation to teach symbolic lessons about morality, character, and philosophy. The author notes that men join the fraternity to develop the self and go beyond selfish concerns through service and ritual.

Freemasonry fills a need for men who seek a path to self-development. The book teaches how a lodge works, what lies behind the symbolism, and where Masonry began. We learn what place the women have, where Prince Hall Masonry fits in and about people like Albert Pike and Taxil. The author discusses the movies made about Freemasonry and what is true and what is not. He even discusses how to become a Freemason.

I found this book to be a fountain of information. It is brief but concise. This is a great book for a potential member or a Brother who just wants some basic understanding of the fraternity. The book is an easy read and I highly recommend it.
